

### ***Meet Charles and Cynthia Rives***

Charles (Chuck) and Cynthia Rives are two long-time Methodists who met at university. He was a in his first year as a graduate student and she was a freshman on her undergraduate studies.

Chuck did his undergraduate program at Eastern New Mexico University and went to the military for his basic training. He then returned and completed his masters in Music Education in the same university. "When I saw Cynthia in the music build-

ing, I thought: that's the girl I want to go out with," Chuck said. They got married and moved to Deming, New Mexico, a small town in the southwest corner of the state, where he started teaching. After two years, they moved to Roswell, New Mexico, where he grew up and graduated high school, and took over the choir program. They stayed there for eight years.

"Everyone in our family, Chuck and all our kids were

born in Roswell, except me," said Cynthia.

When Fara (daughter) was six months old and David was six years old, they moved to Tempe, Arizona where he pursued his doctorate. Then they moved to Stephenville, Texas, where Chuck got his first collegial position as a choir director at Tarleton State University, where he stayed for 29 years.

From the beginning, Cynthia was adamant about being around her family. "The first thing

I said to Chuck was, 'I want to be around my family (my dad was the head resident at Chavez Hall, a men's dorm and where my family also lived) and you have to go to church with me."

Cynthia has always been a Methodist and jokes about Chuck: "I used to say that he changed churches with every girl he dated," she laughed.

"I was actually a Methodist but visited the Episcopal, Church of Christ and a few others before coming back to the Meth-

odist church when I met Cynthia," Chuck said.

Chuck retired from Tarleton and they thought that the right thing to do was to move back closer to their children. Both Fara Crawford and David Rives and their families live in Denton, so that's where they moved. It will be three years in November since they started to attend FUMC-Denton and became members.

Both Chuck and Cynthia are actively involved in the ministries of this church. Chuck is the

Mission's Committee Chair, sings in the Chamber and Chancel Choirs and is involved with New Horizons Sunday School class, where he teaches occasionally. Missions, though, are his biggest passion.

Cynthia is also involved in missions and New Horizons. In addition, she is a member and serves as a director on the National Board of United Methodist Women, where she leads a circle called Encouragers, that meets on Sundays after the 11 am service.

The Rives have always been involved in missions. When in Stephenville, Chuck led a youth choir as a volunteer. They started up with three girls and grew to a group of 30 students. The main reason for the growth, according to Chuck, was that since the first year they took a mission trip with the choir. "We took those three girls to Austin and sand in a the church and they got to visit the Capitol.

"We started to do a music mission: We took the choir to nursing homes, retirement homes and

taught music to children. We took them all over the US, Mexico, Jamaica, many mission trips. We taught them how to do mission," added Chuck.

Logistics for these trips can be challenging but once they learned they branched out and took two trips to Kenya and took several medical teams into Mexico.

"Our daughter is a physician assistant and she mentioned that when she got to the rotation for geriatrics, all her peers got uncomfortable because they had no experience with the elderly. She mentioned how important those

mission trips were to her, because she felt so comfortable around them," said Cynthia.

"Missions play an important part in growing your Christianity," she added.





When Cynthia was a kid, she had the opportunity to go to a mission trip to an Indian mission in Farmington, New Mexico, with youth from all around the state. "I still remember the devotions of one of those pastors, a younger pastor, who later became a bishop, talking about how the church is supposed to work. It was a story where ships were being wrecked in the turbulent sea, so they built a light house. The ships would know the safe passage and would bring the

people in off the ship to safety at the lighthouse. Over time they improved the lighthouse and it ended up that they turned out the light, because when they brought those people out of the boats they were dirty and wet and were messing up the new pool table and their furniture...so, they turned off the light. I don't want us to be a church that turns off the light. A friend of mine once said that churches can become country clubs with a cross and I don't want to be part

of a country club with a cross. I want it to be a church that has the light on, where we go out and bring people in," she added.

It was quite hard for Chuck or Cynthia to think of the most special mission trip they participated in. "All the missions are so special, each one in a different way. But I think one of my trips to Kenya really got to me. When we went to Maua a very small community in Kenya, we went to the Methodist hospital. It was a six-hour drive from where we were, not because it was too far but because of the road conditions. There are around 500,000 people in the surrounding areas. There is a government hospital, but this is the only good hospital for 500,000 people. We were there and they did just about everything: pediatric care, cancer and aids care, surgical center and a place for moms to get ready to have their babies. They have their children and then they go home. One morning, we were having a devotion in the

chapel and while staying outside waiting to go in we heard this moaning, kind like a crying going on. I asked a missionary what was going on, what was that sound, and she said that probably a baby died. That's the way they grieve. It broke my heart. The United Methodist Church was being the lighthouse, a place where people could come and have hope. Just to be there at that moment really spoke to me about why we need to be everywhere, wherever we can be, according to Chuck "Mission has to happen locally but also out of your area, nationally, internationally, wherever we can be."

For Cynthia, Kenya was also a very strong experience, because you see real poverty. "Every community has poverty, but the extent of the poverty in Africa is immense. To see the children with empty bottles with a little bit of glue on top of it and them sniffing that glue... Women get into prostitution but prostitutes can only have one child with them and so they push the older child out on the street. It's all very heartbreaking. When people die, they don't take the bodies of their family members and bury them because they believe that would make the soil infertile and they wouldn't want to damage the ground they own. So, when someone dies, those bodies stay in the hospital for them to take care of." said Cynthia.

Cynthia is actively involved with United Methodist Women. She says that it's one of the most important ways she finds to be more than a nominal



Christian. "I'm a Christian, check that box. UMW helps me live my faith, because we have a program of studies aiming at spiritual growth, social action in the world. We learn so much. UMW continues my Christian education. My mother, a very outgoing and flamboyant person, and paternal grandmother (the proverbial little librarian with the bun) were both in the predecessor organization of the United Methodist Women. I love that any woman can find a place in this mission organization. All kinds, all ages of women can find a place, help deal with issues like social and climate justice, among others.

Chuck speaks about all the missions with a lot of

passion. "The Ministry at the Border happened almost as an accident. The Tampkes (Dale and Molly) just mentioned that they were going to the border to help those people and we said we were going with them. We didn't know exactly how we were going to help but we, the two couples, just went. And that's how it started. Sometimes opportunity just presents itself and you just must be open to grab it. You just have to say yes. It helps that we have been in mission for so long that we are not intimidated by that," he said.

“Everyone needs to work their mission muscle, you know, the more you do the easier it gets. Be not afraid.”

"People talk about mission as it relates to the physical part of it, the construction of a house, or the medical support. But what I see most important are the relationships you develop. The

real key to mission is going on a trip and getting to know people, showing our love and support for them. It's just showing up. They think 'why do these people from the US come to help me?' They never think how much they give back to us. The relationships we create make a difference in both lives." she adds.

"I think the real thing is mutuality of mission, so that wherever we go, we understand that we go to be giving and open to them, but they are also giving a lot to us. The love that we receive is tremendous. We don't think that we will solve all their problems, but we know we will be with them and see how we can work together. I went to the border four times last year. When I heard that the bishop was going to Honduras, I thought that we needed to do that. When you see all those families coming and seeking asylum, you need to understand why they are coming, what is going on in their countries that they go through dangerous trips to come to this country.

We visited churches and met leaders in Honduras. We made connections with these young churches. In these places, where there are scarce resources to live at safe level, having food, clothing and housing, they trust in God and I believe they recognize in us that we need to learn to trust God. And they pray for us not to worship things but worship God. To not trust what we can do but trust what He can. That is a blessing that I'll sign up for at any time," Cynthia said.

"There are so many opportunities for people to connect with God and with others through this church. You can connect through worship, service, being a community of faith, supporting each other and lifting each other up. But you can also take action. As we grow our faith, how do we demonstrate our faith? Sunday School classes help you grow spiritually, the music ministry blesses people

either by participating or just listening to it. This is a mission church, it's one of the reasons why we love being here. Here we talk the talk and walk the walk. This is a church that acts. This is a church full of amazing people. We are acting disciples, disciples of Jesus Christ for transformation of the world," Chuck added.

We come to the church to be family. "That's why I told Chuck on our first



meeting, that I wanted to be close to my family and my church." Cynthia ended.



# LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

## *Dear members:*

"If you need help, ask a very busy person. They will always find time to help you. Ask someone who has nothing to do and you will hear them say they are 'too busy to help,'" my great grandmother used to say to me.

At the time, it didn't make much sense to me. How could someone who has nothing to do say they were busy? But worse, how could a very busy person find time to help?

As I grew up, I started to pay more attention to people, their lifestyles, their beliefs, their victories and struggles and even the time they had to spare. And I came to understand what my great grandma meant.

I have an acquaintance who is married and whose husband holds a very good position in a well-known company. That allows her not to work, so she is a stay-at-home mom of one five-year-old girl. I'd say the girl is pretty low-maintenance, easy to distract and entertain, loves reading and

uses a cell phone and its applications better than I do. A cleaning company has her house spotless every week and she has someone to cook for her. She is always mad that her husband, who works five-six days a week, 7 am to 7 pm "doesn't help her with the chores." And...never has time for anything! Every time I talk to her she is overwhelmed with the amount of stuff she must do. Ha!

I have another one in a different but similar situation: also marrieds, three kids, all in school. Her husband could really use some financial help if she were willing to get a job. She is by herself all day and her house is always upside down, with dishes in the sink, toys everywhere, laundry baskets always full. And, she never has time for anything!

Then I think of my own situation. I work, I clean, I cook, I take care of family, two dogs, I exercise, I do groceries, I have hobbies, go to church and more. And... I always find time to see my friends, go for happy hour, have people at my place. I make time to time to help



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my family and my friends, and many times, strangers.

What about God? Who could be busier than God? And doesn't He always find time to help, to be on our side, to listen to us and to give us comfort? And He does that for all of us who trust and believe in Him.



To be considered for publication, please submit the information 45 days before its start.
- 2** Social media - Please submit your materials at least two weeks in advance to be considered for social media channels.
- 3** Posters and flyers - Please submit your request a month in advance. If you make your own posters or flyers, they must be approved by the Communications office and will be hung by the Church office personnel.  
Third party online calendars (local media websites, etc) - please submit materials at least two weeks in advance.
- 4** Press releases - Please submit all information 30 days before event.  
  
All text materials must be submitted in Word and images in JPEG or PNG. All submitted materials are subject to editing by the Communications office. All images submitted must contain its source so copyright can be verified. If the submitter is the author of the photo an authorization for its use must be submitted along with the image.
- 5** Submission must also contain name, phone number and email of the sender or the contact person for the event, group, project or activity, along with an authorization to have the information published in all church publications and social media.

The ministries of FUMC-Denton are actively touching lives as we work together to Shine God's Love into Every Life. We had a great Fall Kickoff with an exciting combined service and a wonderful luncheon following as over 400 persons celebrated the 162nd birthday of our church. And nearly that many enjoyed the culinary handiwork and servant leadership of our Hispanic congregation as they hosted Fiesta Latina a couple of weeks ago. And it won't be long before we will welcome over 1,000 children to our campus to celebrate a safe Halloween as we Share the Harvest and


Trunk 'r Treat.

On the financial front, we have good news to report again this month. Although we missed the budget for September by about \$12,000, income from giving continues to run ahead of budget for the year by about \$26,000 and about \$58,000 ahead of the same time last year. In addition, our expenses continue to be below budget. Thanks to all of you who give so faithfully to support the mission and ministries of this church! Your prayers, presence, service and witness are so important to the life of this church. And it's your gifts that make it all possible.


Our fall funding campaign is underway, and we had a great start on Celebration Sunday with an all-music service with communion. As of Thursday, October 10, we had received 266 Estimates of Giving for a total of \$1,175,175. This includes \$20,491 of new giving, \$30,201 from contributors who did not turn in a card last year, and \$1,124,483.00 from those who turned in a card last year. We still

have a significant number who have yet to turn in their EOG, but that will happen over the next couple of weeks. 
## September Giving Income

Mirando hacia atrás a esas experiencias, todo lo que puedo decir es, gracias, Señor. Gracias por la familia y el hogar que he encontrado aquí con mi iglesia Jesús Fuente de Vida. Como estaba rodeada de personas que me amaban, me cuidaban, me guiaban y sobre todo oraban por mí, puedo

permanecer aquí y compartir mi testimonio con ustedes.

El amor y la protección que recibimos de Dios no se debe guardar en estas cuatro paredes ni guardar para nosotros mismos. También debe compartirse con aquellos que han pasado por esos momentos que cambian la vida. Sin la ayuda de mi Pastor Mauricio Orozco, el Pastor Lee y muchos otros hombres y mujeres de Dios que estuvieron allí para mí en esos momentos de desesperación y ansiedad, nunca hubiera podido decir como hoy; Ebenezer; "Hasta ahora, el Señor nos ha ayudado". Then four years later I would receive the most eye-opening, life-changing experience.

On June 14, 2019 I ended up hospitalized for a week due to a life-threatening diagnosis. That week seemed like months to me. I remember laying in my hospital bed on my third day there with unstoppable pain, praying to God and asking Him that if it was the end of the line for me, then let it be your will. Right after my prayer, my Pastor Mauricio Orozco and Pastor Don Lee walked into my room. Right then I knew it was a confirmation from my Heavenly Father.

Looking back to those experiences all I can ever say is, Thank you Lord. Thank you for the family and home I have found here with my church Jesus Fuente de Vida. Because I was surrounded by people who loved me, cared for me, guided me and mostly importantly prayed for me, I am able to stand here and share my testimony with you.

The love and protection we receive from God is not to be kept in these four walls or to be kept for ourselves. It needs to be shared with those who have been through those life-changing moments as well. Without the help of my Pastor Orozco, Pastor Lee and many other men and women of God who were there for me in those moments of desperation and anxiety, I would have never been able to say like today;

Ebenezer; "Till now the LORD has helped us." I hope and pray my brothers and sisters in the love of the Lord that we continue to shine the light outside these doors and walls and share with others like myself how the Lord continues to show unending love. God bless you.

The requirements include:






